

"Men, where have you found this man? who is said, 'I beseech you, therefore, that on present your bodies a living sacrifice,' etc.? For a while it never easily entered into my mind what it meant. The Church has the privilege of living in the death of Christ, and here is the distinction. God is made manifest between the Church and the rest of mankind—because we suffer with Him, 'we shall reign with Him.' And He is greater. His 'peculiar promises' are not merely the promises of divine nature." (2 Pet. 1:4.) This comes assured to us the privilege of dying down our lives. You remember over the Apostle puts in his letter to the Philippians (Chap. 2:10): "That I may know the power of his resurrection."

Paul knew the resurrection was to come to the just and the unjust, and he says, "if I might know the power of resurrection! What then are the conditions? Being 'unseen conformed unto His death'—if we do not go into His death, we will not go into His resurrection. How do we go into His death? What is the difference between that's death and the death of any other man? Christ's death was a sacrifice, and we are counted in with Him as a part of His sacrifice; so we become participants with Him in the sufferings of the present time and the glories to come.

(Question.) What is the scriptural objection to understanding the Apostle's argument in Romans VIII:11 to be that our "old man" as a sinner is in the person of his substitute, Jesus Christ? (Answer.) That question should be raised with him (Jesus) to walk in a "new life" of holiness; "I can give a brief exposition of these errors."

(Answer.) "What shall we say then? Shall we continue in sin that grace may abound? God forbid. Now hold we, that are dead to sin, live no longer therein." You will perceive the Apostle is not speaking to Jews, nor to Gentiles, nor to mere heathens, but to those who are dead to sin, and have surrendered themselves to die with Christ. "Know ye not, that so many as were baptised into Jesus Christ were baptised into His death?" etc. "We know to be baptised into Christ is not merely sacramental death. But you are baptised into His death. Was that a death to us? I think not. He 'knows no death.' 1 Pet. 2:23. He could not die a man's death. We were baptised into His death. That death to us, or our death, was not a death to sin. Our death includes a death to sin. When we give up our lives that we may share Christ in His sacramental death. It means we have dedicated to battle against sin—have avowed that we will lay down our lives in battle against sin. How shall we that are saved, to sin, and whose lives are consecrated to Christ, how could we consent to sin? We might as well confess the perfections of the flesh, but to be a wormy sin would be impossible to those who have given up their lives."

"Therefore we are buried with him in baptism into death, that like as Christ was raised up from the dead by the glory of the Father, even so we also should walk in newness of life. For if we have been planted together in the likeness of His death, we shall be also in the likeness of His resurrection." That is to say, if we have given up ourselves to be like Him in death, "we shall also be like Him in resurrection." His resurrection; the resurrection, and death, all go together. "Whoever goes into His death goes into His resurrection, and who does not, does not go at all surely as Jesus died, was a sacrificial death, so must ours be."

"Knowing this, this old man is crushed with him, that the body of sin might be destroyed, that henceforth we should not serve sin." This old man is crushed. Just as Christ at his baptism had given up his earthly life, and the remaining years

Dear Friends and Brothers.—A copy of the Chicago Daily Tribune recently reached my notice containing articles, the object of which was an attack upon the International Bible Students Association and Pastor Russell. Among other points of attack was Miracle Wheat, and, thinking some information on the subject might be of interest to our friends, I enclose herewith picture and data relative to field of Miracle Wheat I grew last year. This picture, advisedly taken in the sun, shows the stalks raised in the state was sent to the secretary of the state board of agriculture, J. C. Mathes, from whom I received a certificate giving this evidence to the world, which would represent the state at the World's Fair, which convenes the 8th of this month.

At first I did not know if this matter did not prove that this was Miracle Wheat, hence they had nothing to bias their decision. So Miracle Wheat received the award.

I have since secured this wheat and planted and cared for it in the regular ordinary way and had no trouble in digesting the seed, and the plants grew and grew, and last fall or next, at \$1 per bushel.

In this section of the country we have to sow more to the acre than in some others, and we did not know the twenty lbs. in the acre rate of sowing, but we sowed at the rate of one-half bushel, and sowed at the rate of three-quarters of a bushel per acre, and we found the three播s to be the better.

My wife yielded forty-five bushels to the acre, and we have had a good yield of wheat in this vicinity and in many instances more than three times as many. If this information is of any use to you, please let me know, and I will have charge of the matter of sending these things airmail before the public we are anxious for the opportunity to furnish the same.

Dr. Gustav Jaumann, professor of physics in a German college, says this species idea of a physical fitness for our civilization is a delusion. Man and woman will rot with it forever. Not a mere 160,000,000 years or so—that is a trifling period to the scientist who thinks in terms of geological epochs—but always. And the best proof that Dr. Jaumann's fellow-entomists take him seriously is the fact that a full translation of his essay on this topic has been made a part of the official report of the Smithsonian Institution of Washington on the progress of science.

The sun isn't cooling off and the earth isn't going to freeze up—that is the first point Dr. Jaumann makes. The new knowledge of the laws of gravitation and energy-transmission makes it clear that every atom of energy the sun throws off in heat goes back to it through the ether-waves that traverse all space. Recent research has dispelled the idea of the center of the earth as a nucleus, fluid mass, gradually moving toward the surface inward. On the contrary, this sphere we live on is as rigid and solid as steel. And the geologists have discovered that in the Cambrian epoch—160,000,000 years ago—the climate of Europe was as warm as ours is today.

The other favorite way of destroying the earth, by having some comet disrupt the cosmic equilibrium so that the planets, including ours, will all fall into the sun and be burned up, won't do either. No, not even if accurate measurement prove that the planets are constantly getting out of their orbits, but they always though back in, and will save the earth if it ever starts off on a tangent. We have to wait to see, evidently. And the start-making scientist is inspired with glowing visions of the future, by that thought.

"The intellectual and physical evolution of humanity," he says, "will be able to do an immeasurable time to meet all human surpassing, perhaps anything the imagination is capable of conceiving."

The society's statement said that appropriations for home and foreign missionary work probably will be reduced.

Many missionaries will be kept at home on furloughs, it was announced.
